### SJF SPIRIT continued...


As I often tell them, "28 (or the number of students in that class-room) heads are better than one."

On February 27th, we began Lent as we usually do by "burying the Alleluia", a joyful word we will not hear or say until Easter. The children take this prohibition seriously. Even during first communion singing practice, we sing the "Alleluia' in a whisper, with some of the second graders steadfastly refusing to sing it at all. They are waiting!

As I asked the 8th graders for help planning Lent, they suggested, "Eight letters in Alleluia, one for each grade 1-8." Wanting to include all the students, we amended that idea to one letter to guide our actions for each school week of Lent. Letter by letter, we would spell out A-L-L-E-L-U-I-A, and allow each letter to inspire our actions for that day. Morning prayers over the P.A. would include suggestions and reports of Lenten promises, offered by students throughout the grades.

In addition, our eighth graders painted each letter and added suggestions starting with that letter to hang in the windows on the school bridge as a visual reminder. The students painted on clear vinyl – to let in the welcome springtime light. Each week we came closer to building the entire word.

We couldn't say, "Alleluia", but we would help this word to come back by our activities and attitudes, our prayers, our sacrifices - the things we gave up, and our Lenten good deeds. We hoped to spell the word, and live the word to have an awesome celebration of Easter, having achieved our goals and fulfilled our Lenten promises.



As I reflect on the blessing of this school year, Lent, and Easter season, this is what those Alleluia letters mean to me:

A Always anticipate success and expect the best of students. This is not my first year here, yet every year feels like my first year because of the excitement of the youngest students for whom every day is a wondrous adventure: Birthdays! Spring! A new tooth! For the older students, I see the enthusiasm they have to form and actualize their dreams. The students' excitement, hope, and enthusiasm is infectious, and inspires great energy as I imagine the wonders which await these students of all ages.

Loyal longevity here gives me the privileged position of seeing how life has unfolded for some of our students. I am happy to see graduates in our neighborhood, some of whom now have children of their own in our school. In addition, I encounter out of town graduates and those who have moved out of the neighborhood at celebrations and, recently, at the wakes of Father Purtell, Jessica Bryar, and at their grandparents' funerals. As with our local alumni, I am delighted with the warm greetings of these students with whom I spent countless school days during their formative years. As I look at them as adults, I try to recognize the fourteen-year-old who graduated back then, and do a mental fast forward to see how they have become the handsome or beautiful young man or woman before me.

**E** "Everything, turn out okay?" I ask them with great curiosity. The students tell me about their lives, about friendships, professions, family. They speak of empathy and compassion which grows as they face life's challenges.

**L** Looking back at their years at Saint John Fisher we talk about the lessons that stayed with them and the relationships they have maintained with their classmates – some of whom have remained life-long friends. They sometimes mention that one event, expression, or life-lesson they learned from a classmate or teacher.

**U** Understanding of faith, its influence in their lives, and their current church community becomes a topic if we have more time. I ask about the ways they are using their unique talents to make the world better: more peaceful, more hope-filled, more loving, and am gratified to hear their successes and hopes for the future. They are involved in communities where faith is important and life-giving.

Intelligence, imagination, and introspection are three qualities I see and admire in our students, past and present. Our graduates are faith-filled laity who bring Christ's presence to their daily lives across a wide variety of professions. They have gone on to be loving parents and family members. They are informed citizens and people of great service to our nation and community. They continue to be vital and enthusiastic people in God's awesome world. They illuminate the lives of others with their insights, humor, and kindness.

A Achieving amazing things, our alumni are attentive to God's spirit moving among them. They are "all-in" to help the poor and those in need. They alleviate suffering and always value faith, family, and community.

As our current students concluded their Lenten practice, they added the final "A" in "Alleluia," with these thoughts from a member of the graduating class of 2019:

"Acknowledge all that you've absorbed over these 40 days, and accept, aid, and appreciate others in God's admirable world."

Alleluia, indeed.

Shout-out to **Sean Slevin** and Team for Bringing Queen of Hearts Raffle to Fisher!


